100th Anniversary

The charity's donations are part of the huge legacy created by Sir

James which includes the family business started in a humble starch mill in Hull in 1840. Today Reckitt is a world-leading health, hygiene and nutrition group employing more than 40,000 people in over 60 countries across the globe.

It's Good To Talk

Our telephone befriending service is a service for visually impaired people who find themselves requiring some extra friendship and support. A befriending call can make all the difference, particularly for those that are housebound and struggling with challenging times.

Our volunteer befrienders make regular calls to their befriendees, offering a friendly listening ear and chat about mutual interests which greatly helps to reduce the feeling of loneliness and isolation.

Many of our befrienders are visually impaired themselves and understand the hurdles and challenges you may face on a daily basis. They can also flag up any help or assistance requested from our other services, such as our Community Advice Officers or assistance with technology. You may find this service helpful if you are not able to attend one of our Day Groups but would like to talk to someone for a friendly chat, the conversation is guided by you, whatever you wish to talk about which may include the things you enjoy, such as TV, hobbies, the weather or just a chat in general, our volunteers are ready to listen. Roy has been a telephone befriender here at Sight Support for 6 years. Roy said "it's a pleasure to come into Sight Support and I always look forward to my weekly visit. I enjoy making my calls and talking to my befriendees. These calls mean as much to me as they do to the people I speak to. I also attend the Sight Support Day Group and enjoy meeting people of all ages".

If you, or someone you know may benefit from receiving a regular friendly call, or if you're a good listener, like to chat and can spare some time on a regular basis, then this role could be perfect for you. We'll give you all the training and support you need and there will be opportunities to meet other volunteers too.

The OrCam Read is a first-of-itskind handheld device, with a smart camera that seamlessly reads text from any printed surface or digital screen out to you. It enables you to enjoy reading things such as the morning paper, a book, and even read anything on your computer or smartphone screen. You may have seen the Orcam Read advertised on the TV!

We also have the Orcam My Eye 2, which is a wearable voice-activated, device. It can instantly read text from any book and screen and it has the brilliant function of recognizing faces of family & friends. It can also accurately identify products & more - all communicated to you in real time.


